#### The next topic for our talks will be Parallel Narratives or how can we expand **Interpretations in Historic House Museums?**

Historic house museums are often perceived as places that tell a single, linear story. But history is rarely that simple. House museums are more than just doors into the past—they are layered spaces where multiple histories intersect, collide, and sometimes contradict one another. Yet too often, these spaces present a single, dominant narrative, leaving out the voices, stories, and perspectives that complicate the past. But what if we leaned into these complexities instead of smoothing them over? Every place holds multiple layers of meaning—shaped by different periods, perspectives, and personal experiences. Behind every room, every artifact, and every curated interpretation, multiple perspectives coexist-some celebrated, others forgotten, contested, or deliberately erased. House museums are complex spaces where past and present intersect, shaped by overlapping histories, cultural shifts, and evolving interpretations.

#### How do we acknowledge and interpret these parallel narratives in house museums?

This year's **DEMHIST Open Talks 2025** will explore **parallel narratives**—the coexistence of multiple, sometimes competing, stories within a single historic house museum. From shifting interpretations over time to contested memories and overlooked voices, we will investigate how museums can embrace complexity rather than erase it.

**DEMHIST Open Talks 2025** invites house museum professionals, researchers, and practitioners to examine how different, and sometimes conflicting, perspectives coexist within the same space. How do museums balance official and unofficial narratives, reconcile competing historical interpretations, and engage audiences in a way that respects complexity rather than simplifying the past? How do house museums navigate conflicting histories? How can interpretation acknowledge tension without reinforcing division? How do we balance truth-telling with engagement and accessibility?

We welcome contributions that address the challenges and opportunities of presenting multiple perspectives in a way that is inclusive, thought-provoking, and engaging for diverse audiences. Whether through historical research, exhibition design, digital tools, or community collaboration, by embracing parallel narratives house museums can foster deeper understanding, critical thinking, and meaningful engagement with history.

This conversation isn't about finding easy answers—it's about exploring ways to **expand storytelling, deepen interpretation, and engage visitors in a more meaningful way**. How can house museums navigate these parallel narratives to create richer, more inclusive storytelling?

#### **Subthemes**

#### 1. Beyond the Official (Story): Interpreting Overlapping Histories

Many house museums focus on a dominant historical figure or a single period, often overlooking the complex, multi-layered history of a place. But what happens when different narratives—official and unofficial, past and present—overlap, contradict, or even clash?

This subtheme explores:

- Case studies of house museums balancing multiple historical narratives
- Strategies for presenting contested or overlooked perspectives
- Addressing power dynamics in storytelling: who speaks, and who is left out?
- Engaging communities in co-creating historical interpretation

#### 2. Shifting Perspectives: The Evolving Narratives of House Museums

History is not static. The stories we tell about the past change as society evolves, reflecting new research, cultural shifts, and contemporary concerns. How do house museums adapt their narratives to stay relevant while remaining historically responsible?

This subtheme invites discussions on:

- Revisiting and revising past interpretations in response to societal change
- The impact of new research, activism, and digital technologies on house museum narratives
- Storytelling techniques that highlight the fluidity of historical meaning
- Case studies of house museums reinterpreting their collections or histories

#### How to Participate

We seek papers, case studies, and creative approaches from museum professionals, researchers, and heritage practitioners. Presentations should focus on real-world examples, innovative methodologies, or thought-provoking theoretical explorations.

- Abstract length: Maximum 300 words
- Format: Online presentation or video tour (detailed guidelines will be provided)
- Deadline for submissions: 23 March 2025
- Notification of acceptance: 13 April 2025
